Wombat Ridge Nature Reserve Cultural burning principles



- 1. Acknowledge and connect with country before you burn it.
- 2. Burn in winter when the understory is still green and grasses have not fully cured.
- 3. Go slow. Wait and watch the fires you light.
- 4. Look for sweet ignition spots that can gently carry the fire.
- 5. If it won't burn, don't force it. Move on elsewhere.
- 6. Burn patches, not lines. Like a Nanna rug.
- 7. Leave some unburned areas.
- 8. Burn downhill not uphill.
- 9. Burn into the wind.
- 10. Use natural containment lines where possible.
- 11. Aim for soft white smoke and black ash with remnants of green. (Not black smoke and white ash which comes from hot fires).
- 12. Look up and see what's above you. Always protect the canopy.
- 13. Burn around the base of trees to remove undergrowth and fuel.
- 14. Remove flammable dead bark from tree trunks to stop fire running up trees.
- 15. Don't fight fire with fire.
- 16. Ensure asset protection (natural and human).
- 17. Make known a refuge zone.
- 18. Include and listen to the RFS and follow its advice in an emergency.
